

CLINICAL CASES OF NON HUMAN PRIMATES HOUSED AT THE “CENTRE DE PRIMATOLOGIE-UdS”, (STRASBOURG, FRANCE) IN 2008-2009.

The present expose is an overview of clinical cases recorded at the “Centre de Primatologie- UdS” over the last year in each of the different type of housing, along with their causes and treatments. The “Centre de Primatologie- UdS” of Strasbourg, France, is housing 500 to 800 Non Human Primates (of 10 different species) either in semi free ranging parks (ethology, breeding), indoor/outdoor facilities (breeding, pension) or confined areas (quarantine, biomedical area, marmoset specialized unit). Most animals live in social groups. In such an environment injuries such as bites, fracture, luxation, frostbite... can easily happen and several diseases can develop in animals kept in quarantine (abcès, diarrhée...) as well as in resident animals (parasitic diseases, diabète). Special attention will be accorded to specific and interesting cases such as multiresistant bacteria surinfection, broken leg complication, luxation and rare parasitic disease (cysticercosis).
